- 3. In the third paragraph, what metaphor gives us a picture of how David views books?
- 4. What metaphors---beginning & ending paragraph 5---convey David's shock at what he reads
- 5. What had David's mother and grandmother purchased for "protection in the country"?
- 6. In the scene at the dinner table, do you see any irony at David's mother's concern for the earth contrasted with the way she treats her own mother?
- 7. What effect does dinner with his family seem to have on David?
- 8. What is the catalyst for David's vision of death?

9.	Once David begins considering mortality, he is compelled to find answers to his questions. How does he question Reverend Dobson? Is he satisfied with the Reverend's answers? Explain.
10.	What passage in Grandpop's Bible gives David comfort?
11.	What philosophy does Mother share with David? Does her philosophy comfort him?
12.	How does David's fear affect his feelings about his normal activities and everyday life?
13.	What do his parents give David for his birthday?
14.	What chore does his mother ask him to accomplish with the gift?
15.	What metaphor describes the barn in daytime?
16.	What phrase describes the change that comes over David with a gun in his hands?
17.	What truth and beauty does David see in the death of the pigeon?
18.	What is the pivotal scene in the story?
19.	What is the key symbol in the story?
20.	What message do you think the author would like to get across to you through David's story?
21.	When you compare and contrast the short story with its movie version, would you say the same message comes across in both?

- 24. An author is able to spell out exactly what his character is thinking and feeling. Movies tend to focus on action. How did the director of the movie attempt to convey David's thoughts and feelings? Was he successful?
- 25. In a coming-of-age story, the main character—typically a teenager—experiences inner changes as he or she moves from childhood to adulthood. These stories tend to emphasis dialogue and internal monologue over action and focus on psychological or moral growth. How does *Pigeon Feathers* fit this genre? What other coming-of-age stories are you familiar with?
